

Current U.S. regulations of imports and exports are complicated, often opaque, and influenced by special interest groups, raising costs for American producers and consumers.

Face masks, baby formula, medical devices, pharmaceuticals, to batteries, cars and furniture, are among thousands of goods whose trade is regulated (see the 308-page 2021 Trade Policy Agenda and 2020 Annual Report). U.S. companies looking to export and U.S. retailers looking to market international goods, turn to

trade policy lawyers and law firms for guidance. It is hard to discover much less follow current and fast changing trade regulations.
